Scottish Government: Expand woodland cover by 100,000ha by 2022

Why plant trees?

Planting trees can provide a range of benefits including:

- Timber and Fuel,
- Shelter,
- Carbon Sequestration,
- Increased Habitat,
- Shading Watercourses,
- Aid Soil Stability,
- Help Limit Diffuse Pollution,
- Improve Natural Flood Management,
- Increase Land Values,
- Improve Landscape and Amenity.



 - creation of small scale woodlands on agricultural land
- Woodland Improvement Grants
 - Planning: Forest Plan
 Woodland Grazing Management Plan
 - Woodland Restructuring
 - Habitat & Species Improved Biodiversity
 - Low Impact Silvicultural Systems Continuous Cover
 - Woods in and Around Towns (WIAT)
- Sustainable Management of Forests



Tree Health

 supports the protection of woodland from the impacts of non-routine tree pests or diseases

Harvesting and Processing


- development of the small-scale premium softwood and hardwood processing sector
- support for equipment to increase harvesting in small, undermanaged woods

Forest Infrastructure

 supports forest access in small-scale or undermanaged woodlands

Forestry Co-operation

- Cost of co-ordinator
- key 'landscape scale' projects involving a number of landowners



FGS Support - Woodland Creation

Rural Payments and Services

Grant Support

9 woodland creation options.

- Initial planting payment
- Annual maintenance payment for five years.
- Range of capital grants available for operations such as fencing and tree protection.

Basic Payment Scheme

- Afforested land will continue to be eligible for the Basic Payment Scheme
- 20 years duration of the woodland creation contract





Forestry Grant Scheme

Scotland's woodlands and forests are a vital national resource and play an important role in rural development and sustainable land use.

As well as helping to reduce the impacts of climate change and providing timber for industry, our forests enhance and protect the environment and provide opportunities for public enjoyment.

The Forestry Grant Scheme (FGS) will support:

- . the creation of new woodlands contributing towards the Scottish Government target of 10,000 hectares of new woodlands per year
- · the sustainable management of existing woodlands

You can apply for support under eight categories:


- · two for the creation of woodland
