Common Grazings Review

The purpose of this workbook is to act as a checklist to help Common Grazings Committees administer their common grazings and fixed equipment. The workbook follows a stage-by-stage process which offers a logical framework to help committees identify processes and/or structures that require update, development and/or improvement.


Why is a Review Needed?

Common grazings are areas of land held in trust over which a number of crofters and other stakeholders from one or more townships hold a right to graze stock and other specified agricultural activities. There are over 1,000 common grazings in Scotland covering over 500,000ha. Each township and/or townships, is required to elect a Common Grazings Committee to act as trustees over the common grazings with a defined range of duties as set out in the Common Grazings Regulations and related crofting legislation.

Who Should Complete the Review?

There is no particular person or persons specified that should complete the review. However, it is important that the individuals chosen are representative of the active crofters in the township(s) and that the review process is seen to engage with the wider community and be as inclusive as possible. Ultimately, it is the elected, or potential members, of the Common Grazings Committee that must have ownership of the review, and it is always helpful to have them engaged in the process at an early stage. We recommend that a chairperson is appointed for the review group.
